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Make good, affordable books accessible to kids: Rohini Nilekani

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BANGALORE: One story was narrated to hundreds of children across the country on Saturday, thanks to the initiative of Pratham Books, headed by Rohini Nilekani. Rohini speaks to STOI on the importance of reading and why it lags among children.

Q: Why are our children unable to read what they are expected to in their grades?

A: As per the ASER 2012 survey, even after five years in school, 50% children are not at the proficiency level expected of them three years earlier. There are many reasons, including the fact that these first generation learners may not come from an enabling environment at home, and do not have adequate facilities in school. It is also because even when they begin to read, they simply do not have the material to take the next steps to fluency and the reading habit.

The problem of providing joyful, engaging books to children from low-income families can be resolved by providing greater access, affordable books and books in local Indi

Q: How good are library facilities in government schools?

A: Many schools do not have well-equipped libraries. Many reading program books for children but books and libraries continue to be scarce.

Often the school libraries that we visit have local literature books which are plain black-and-white, text-heavy ones or donated books like Harry Potter, Roald Dahl, Enid Blyton etc. The problem is one, children find it difficult to relate to these characters. Two and more importantly, even class 6 children find it difficult to read such long English books. Therefore these are of little value in such environments.

Q. How can we improve the reading ability in schools?

A: It is not difficult to get children to fall in love with reading. But they need access to good quality, joyful material appropriate for their reading level. This enables a child to confidently select a level appropriate book and have the pleasure of finishing it.

Thirdly the books should be in the child's native language, or at least in the medium of instruction in school. And lastly, regular reading period should be a must in every school and a trained teacher should be present to

help those who need it.

Q: How did you come up with 'One Day, One Story' initiative?

A: Ours is a societal mission. Many communities need to be involved to create a reading nation. One easy way is to get people involved through as many book readings as possible. And since we cannot be everywhere, we reached out to a wider community to conduct book-related events in

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their towns, on their own. We now have an annual nationwide event where everyone reads the same story on the same day.

Q: What is the importance of inculcating reading habit in an e-age? Is reading from books different from that of reading on ipad/laptop? Which one would you recommend?

A: Reading is reading, whether consumed in print format or digitally. Children who have engaged well with the written word can adapt themselves to consuming information any which way. Today's children, irrespective of their socio-economic background, are digitally savvier than their parents.

As a generation we are still in love with the feel and smell of the printed book, the comfort of curling up in bed and reading our favourite novel. Younger generations might become equally comfortable with new gadgets.

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
